The club honored Earth Day by enjoying gorgeous Ft. Desoto Park during its second annual Rotary Run. Runners had their choice of a 1-mile fun run, 5K, or 10K. It was an awesome community event and raised over \$18,000 to benefit environmental causes in the Tampa Bay area.

Rotary District 6950 Matching Grants The club applied for and was approved for a \$12,772.86 matching grant to increase Tampa Bay oyster habitat to mitigate the effects of future red tide blooms.

SERVICE PROJECTS

- The Club participated in at least 15 service projects with members contributing over 1,000 service hours.
- <u>St. Pete Youth Farm</u> (August) Rotarians contributed 28 volunteer hours working at the farm.
- <u>Special Olympics</u> (October) Volunteers provided organizational support for the Special Olympics Golf Tournament.
- <u>Rotary Camp Florida</u> (November) The club participated in a service day at Rotary Camp Florida.
- <u>Salvation Army Bell Ringing</u> (December) Volunteers rang the bell for 48 hours!
- <u>Sallie House Easter Event</u> (April) a group of volunteers descended on Sallie house to provide the children living there an Easter-themed party complete with egg hunts, egg dying, and a delicious lunch.
- <u>St. Petersburg Free Clinic</u> (December & April) The club provided volunteers for two food packing events to assist the SPFC's We Help FRESH food pantry, which will feed hundreds of local residents.
- <u>Keep Pinellas Beautiful Trail</u> (September, February & June) Club members, Rojans, and Interact members provided close to 400 volunteer hours over three separate events to pick up hundreds of pounds of trash (and one car bumper!) along the Pinellas Trail.
- <u>Blood Drives</u> (September, February & June) The Club coordinated three blood drives for One Blood.

OTHER PROJECTS

- <u>Ukraine</u> (April): Over \$5,700 was donated by club members and sent to Rotary International to support their special contributions to the Ukrainian relief effort.
- John Thompson Nursing Scholarship (November/December) Sold special wildlife themed Rotary calendars created by Tom Bell to benefit the John Thompson Nursing Scholarship. The net proceeds of \$270 were donated to the SPC Foundation designated to the John Thompson Nursing Scholarship, which is now fully endowed and being awarded to qualified nursing students. An additional donation allowed us to donate \$1,500 more to the scholarship.

- <u>Children's Books Literacy Project</u> A children's book was donated in honor of each of our guest speakers. These books were collected and delivered to Happy Worker's Children's Center (R'Club).
- <u>Survey</u> A club-wide survey was conducted to determine members' interests and to gather ideas for future service projects and socials.
- <u>Member Interest Clubs</u> Two special interest clubs were formed: a book club and a travel club. The Book Club launched with the Splendid and the Vile by Erik Larson. The Travel Club is putting together a trip to Kentucky.

3. INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

- <u>Polio Plus</u> Polio Donations: The club has collected over \$1,000 this year designated to the Polio Plus Campaign.
- <u>Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY)</u> Club members donated over \$88,000 to the Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund. Our Club led the District and accounted for over 20% of total district giving this year.
 - International Service Trip -- Team of 5 traveled to the Bahamas in March to assist with hurricane recovery in the Abacos. Club members gave them a working science lab again, which hadn't been used since the storm in 2019. The volunteers refurbished cabinets, installed a ceiling, painted, and restored the floor. Teachers and students were excited to be able to use it again.
